
Chase Hughes

A few months ago I noticed a new guy being heavily promoted on Youtube named Chase Hughes. Yeah, his name is already a huge red flag, but let's not stop there. He sells himself as an expert on psyops and he started out in the first weeks by telling you how to spot them and the people pushing them. I had never heard of him, but it looked to me like he was trying to sell himself as some kind of ex-CIA agent ("CIA profiler") blowing the cover of their own projects, a sort of whistleblower, now coming over to your side. That of course makes no sense, since why would a CIA agent or any other psyops expert suddenly switch sides at his age (fairly young) and turn on his superiors? Is that what they are trained to do? And if he was going to do that, would he do it on Youtube? Of course not. If he really were turning on his superiors, he would be banned from Youtube, since Youtube is run by those people. He is also promoted by Joe Rogan, Dr. Phil, *Forbes*, and *Vogue*. So I knew he was bad news from the start. Oh, and he uses the CIA badge on his website, pretty much outing himself. They would not allow him to use their name and image for promotion if there was no connection.

He actually has a video on how to read people's faces. Unfortunately I can read his, since I am a different kind of psyops expert—not CIA-trained but a sort of natural. Of course it wasn't that hard, since I was already on alert from his name and his claim to be a psyops expert. And the fact he was being heavily promoted on Youtube. But I could also read his face: I could tell he was lying from the first second, just from looking at his dead eyes.

But today his project moved into stage two, allowing anyone to see exactly what he was up to. See his new video <u>"This Isn't Reality—and I'll Prove It".</u> Does he prove this isn't reality in 11 minutes? No, but he tries. We now see he is part of the whole "life is a simulation" psyop, which mainstream physics is also pushing hard. So this expert on psyops is now psyoping you. Cosy, ain't it? He spent a few scant weeks trying to buddy up to you, and now jumps whole-hog into this "life-as-a-simulation" gambit. So they are really rushing it, telling me how desperate they are.

This video is really really weak. Much weaker and more transparent than his previous efforts, which

were almost passable. He led with a lot of truth, to hook you, but now that is all out the window, and all that is left is silly mind games. Here is how it starts:

This is going to rip a hole in your brain you cannot plug. It's going to permanently change the way you see stuff.

Those are the first two sentences of the video. With the usual scary music and visuals. He doesn't even get close to doing that, but he tells you in the first sentence what his instructions were. Which seems a little obvious to me. Hamhanded. Unsubtle. Because it is to admit that this is what they are trying to do: brainwash you into believing there is no reality. With 11 minutes of fluff on Youtube. That's how little they think of you, and how little they have left in the bag. This is what has become of the Mighty Wurlitzer: a doughy faced dweeb on Youtube thinking he is going to rip a hole in your brain with some flashing lights and doom music.

One of the early tricks Hughes uses is dropping the name of famous French philosopher Baudrillard, implying Baudrillard was telling us we are living in a simulation. But he wasn't. simulation was the media, not reality itself. Baudrillard told us all our information had been hijacked. which I have confirmed in thousands of papers, going way beyond Baudrillard, but that isn't anything like reality being a computer simulation. Hughes says there is no going back, and he implies it is because we have recognized a deeper, Matrix-like truth: the real world doesn't exist at all. But he shows absolutely no evidence for that, and neither Baudrillard nor myself have promoted that idea, in any form. In my case, just the opposite. I have been telling my readers for years that CIA is pushing this simulation psyop to create confusion. They need the cover, so they are trying to convince you the distortion is actually even bigger than you realized: it isn't just a false and fake world manufactured by them to control you, it is a false and fake world created by the gods or aliens themselves, one in which you are no more than a few lines of computer code. It is the ultimate eyes-off project, you see. "It isn't us, it is gods or aliens". It isn't just the news that is fake and the textbooks that are false, it is your very existence that is fake. In other words, as usual, it isn't them, it is YOU. They want you to stop analyzing them and outing them and start analyzing yourself and your wife and your pets and your walls, poking them all for solidity. Because if they can get you to do that, they can skate one more time

So let's return to his picture under title. Notice anything strange? Well, I have taught you to study backgrounds, so let's do that. The first thing I notice is the NCI and the rabbit on his shirt. Apparently NCI is some online "university" he runs, really just a website, and NCI stands for Neuro-Cognitive Intelligence. But I note that he got the "Intelligence" in there, and I remind you NCI also stands for Naval Criminal Investigative, telling me Chase Hughes may come out of ONI, Naval Intelligence. The rabbit is really weird, reminding me not only of Donnie Darko, but of the hare as the consort of gods like Osiris.

I also see a little white pillow in the background with a black cross on it, which looks out of place. That is a Greek Cross, but promoting the world as simulation is wildly un-Christian and irreligious, so it must be something else. That would be a Navy Signal Flag, whose meaning is "Stop your intentions and watch for my signals. Individual recall." Ties in to the NCI thing, doesn't it?

I did some more digging on this guy, but didn't find much. He has no bio on his website that I could find. Apparently he got his start in 2007 by publishing a book called *The Passport*, on how to trick

women into bed. So that is the kind of guy we are looking at here, not really a surprise.

If you watch the whole video, which isn't easy, since it is so blobby, you realize it sort of fizzles out. I guess he was hoping he could "rip a hole in your brain" by just telling you he would, and that you would do the rest yourself. Because all the fear is toploaded in the title and the first minute, with the next ten minutes backsliding into pretty meaningless simulations in the media, which aren't scary at all. He talks about four levels of simulacra, but actually doesn't show us even two. He just labels the same sort of shallow simulation four times. So his "proof" goes nowhere. In fact, as you can tell from comments, his audience just thought he was talking about media fakes. They weren't shocked at all.

You will say I misinterpreted his title, but I don't think so. My guess is this is just the beginning, and that he is trying to work you into it slowly. In other words, he isn't finished with you. I predict he will try to push you further and further into the pool in coming weeks and months. Otherwise, why the title "This isn't reality"? Walmart having overpolished fruit or Disneyland having pretend towns isn't proof this world isn't real, so Hughes must be up to more than just pointing out pretense.

But whether or not you believe that is what Hughes is pushing, it is undeniable that many on Youtube *are* pushing that. See <u>this</u> for example—the first thing that comes up on a search—or <u>this</u>. I find Joe Rogan is pushing two of the top four results that come up at Youtube, that being Rizwan Virk and Lex Fridman. Why would Rogan be doing that? I thought <u>he was supposed to be a Christian</u> now. Elon <u>Musk is also pushing this psyop</u>. So is "scientist" Neil Degrasse Tyson. Why?

I have told you why on my science site, back in 2016, in a paper on Donald Hoffman, who is still selling this crap on Youtube as well. That was in a response to an article from *The Atlantic*, showing not only that this has been going on for years, but that it is coming right out of the mainstream. That is the paper where I coined the term bognitive science, instead of cognitive science. These people were hired not to do science, but to create another CIA bog, another massive gaslighting.

<u>I did the same thing with David Deutsch in 2022</u>, outing him as a complete fraud.

I was blowing this project even earlier, in 2015, in <u>my paper on "Time as an Illusion"</u>. It isn't an illusion.

Also see this 2020 article, where I hit the same subject, this time outing Tegmark and Kastrup as spooks. And this follow-up article a month later, outing Scientific American as a CIA front itself. Like CNN, MSNBC, the Washington Post, and the rest of the mainstream media and science, Scientific American has taken a drubbing in the past decade, losing a large part of their audience, and I like to take partial credit for that. No one has had such a full-court press on the mainstream as I have, not even Alex Jones, and that is especially true regarding science, where Jones doesn't even have a toe in. He just reprints mainstream press releases with no comment, and like Joe Rogan often promotes the mainstream gaslighting in physics and astronomy. Same for Mike Adams at NaturalNews, who pretends to be alternative but who just as often just reprints mainstream propaganda. We have seen him do it many times on the solar cycles, for instance.

This shows you this project is media-wide, both mainstream and alternative, left and right. The CIA and other agencies are gaslighting you from all points on the compass, all hours of the day and night, though places like Youtube are especially bad. Youtube has gotten much worse in the past three years and it will continue to get worse. Even videos that don't address these topics directly are littered with embedded prompts, pushes, and promotions, and nothing is clean. Almost everything you now

encounter is soaked in propaganda. In that sense, Chase Hughes is right, though we didn't need him to tell us that. And of course that has nothing to do with reality being a simulation. A lie and a simulation aren't the same thing. These people are soaked in lies, but that doesn't make them sims.
