

Camp Mystic

Let me just be the first to say this whole Camp Mystic story is throwing up all the usual red flags, making my Spidey senses tingle. 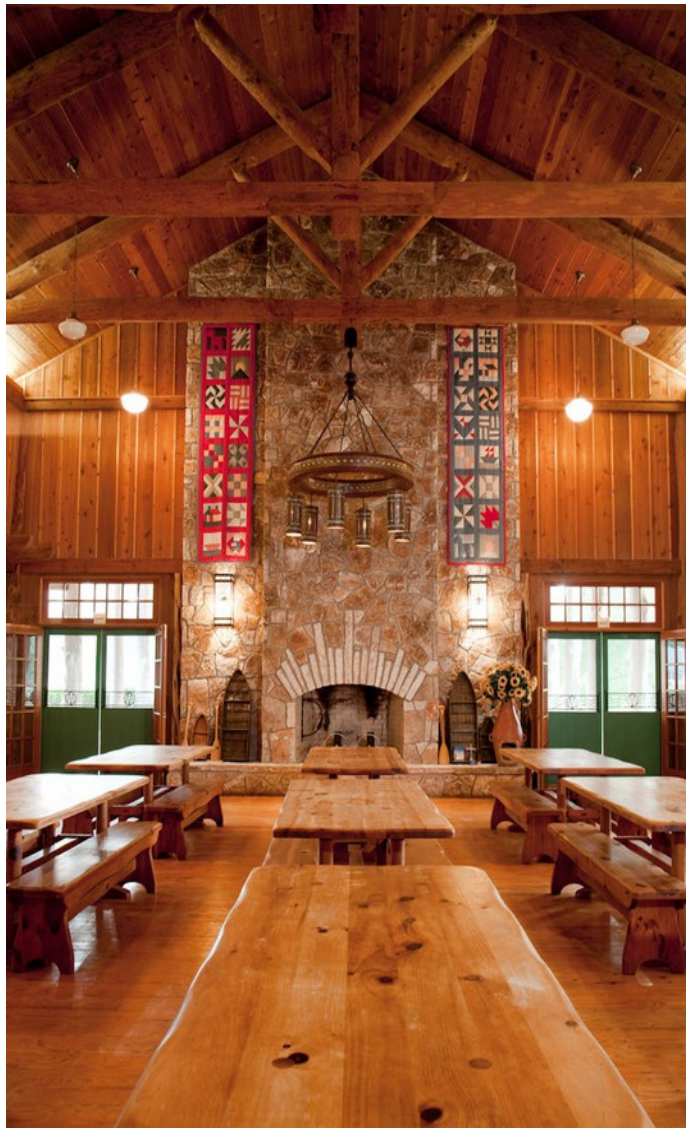
The second little girl is of-color, probably Hispanic. Here's another:

But my point was that Sadie Perkins' comments look scripted. No one who works for the city is going to go on social media and call little dead girls cunts who deserved to die. It isn't believable on the face of it. Equally unbelievable is white Houston pediatrician Christina Probst, who posted on Facebook

May all visitors, children, non-MAGA voters and pets be safe and dry. Kerr County MAGA voted to gut FEMA. They deny climate change. May they get what they voted for.

She was allegedly immediately fired for that by her employer Blue Fish Pediatrics. I think she has a right to say whatever she wants without getting fired for it, I just don't think any sane person would say that. Again, it looks scripted from Langley, this time to promote Red/Blue wars. Social media has been inundated with these comments from bots and agents, using the fake event to continue to drive in the usual wedges.

What is weird about that photo under title is not the whiteness of it, it is her t-shirt. Why does she have a bull in a headdress? Was that added later by AI as a clue? I see it as a marker of El or Ba'al, the god of the Phoenicians represented by a bull, but I know you will need more than that. So read on. I have so much more.

Am I implying Camp Mystic is a front for the Klan? Of course not, since the Klan is also manufactured by the same people. I am showing the Camp has Freemasonic markers all over it, and I remind you Freemasonry is just the Phoenicians. That's why they reference Hiram: Hiram was King of the Phoenicians in the time of David and Solomon. Any least research allows you to discover that this [Camp Mystic has actually been in serious trouble](#) since at least 2006, when the Stacy/Eastland family that owned it started squabbling over money. They spent years in court suing one another, spending north of \$9 million on attorneys fee alone. A settlement was reached in 2012, with \$7.2 million being paid by Dick Eastland to his siblings* to surrender their NFP interests in the camp. One problem: [the camp was only worth about \\$8.2 million](#), according to published property values. So best guess is the camp never reopened after Covid. Other similar camps for the very wealthy in that area went bankrupt in the same time period, closing their gates for good. In fact, there was another all-girls camp nearby in Hunt, named Heart O' the Hills. It wasn't in session, but its owner and director Jane Ragsdale also allegedly died. So this just gets curiouiser and curiouiser, since Heart O' the Hills isn't right on the river, like Mystic. According to Google Maps it is across the highway and about 400 ft. uphill from the river. Which reminds us the south fork of the Guadalupe is a very small river, about the width of a four-lane in most places. It isn't the Nile. Which is why these places weren't even considered flood plain: they had never flooded before like this in history. Mystic has been around for almost a century and nothing like this ever happened before. You will say they didn't have cloud seeding until recently, which is true, but that is another part of the story that looks manufactured. The speed with which this was assigned to cloud-seeding gone wrong is astonishing, with places like Infowars digging up government documents within 24 hours. How does Alex Jones have immediate access to stuff like this? He was doing it again yesterday, claiming he just got off the phone that morning with insiders at the Pentagon, CIA, and the White House, who confirmed the Epstein cover-up was due to internal wars in the Intelligence agencies. What? Why would those sources be taking calls from Alex Jones? Marjorie Taylor Greene almost immediately called for a ban on all weather modification. Does Congress normally work that fast? No, so that part of the story looks manufactured as well. The whole thing stinks of another vast Phoenician project, part of the purpose of which appears to bail out these rich camp people, and part of which is the usual promotion of civil war.

Which makes this part of the current story even more suspicious: one of the 27 who allegedly died at Mystic wasn't a camp girl, it was this same Dick Eastland himself, age 70. He allegedly drowned

trying to save the girls. Not really believable since [in a separate story](#) we are told the National Guard and Coast Guard were there with helicopters, saving upwards of 250 girls. So there was no reason for a fat 70-year-old guy to be swimming around trying to rescue able-bodied girls. Was he an ex-Olympic swimmer? Nope.

Since Kerrville and Hunt aren't on the coast, it doesn't make much sense to me that the Coast Guard would lead the rescue here. And since the National Weather Service allegedly didn't issue a flood warning, and the flood started about 4am, who called in the National Guard in the middle of the night? With 750 girls allegedly there and a flood surge of 26 feet in 52 minutes, we should have seen the entire camp annihilated, with a death toll far above 27. The north of two camps was fully in the flood plain, being just feet from the river, and half the girls were allegedly sleeping there. It only takes about two minutes to drown, so the story is not making any sense.

At that last link to the *Daily Mail*, they are selling you Coast Guard hero Scott Ruskan, 26, who allegedly saved 165 girls all by himself. Really? Their reporter Germana Poleo (fake name alert) calls him Scott Ruskan and Scott Raskan on the same page. Great reporting, AI. This just happened to be his first ever rescue mission. What are the odds, eh? First day on the job and he saves 165 people and gets his name splashed all over the world.

I guess he will be running for Congress next. The Coast Guard sure has some good photographers, hunh? That looks right out of Hollywood. Strange they couldn't get his full name on his pack. Also strange that he needs two helmets. I see only one head.

Upon arrival, Ruskan became the sole coordinator on site, directing the entire rescue operation and coordinating triage under extreme conditions.

OK, let me see if I have this straight: a 26-year-old guy on his first mission became the sole coordinator of this entire rescue operation? And why exactly would this kid be coordinating triage? Is he also a doctor? No, he is a petty officer and rescue swimmer, so he shouldn't have been coordinating triage.

They also admit in that article that it took his team six hours to fly in from Corpus Christi, due to bad weather. Which was way too late to save anyone from drowning, as we have already established. It is 200 miles from Corpus Christi to Hunt, so it makes no sense to call in rescue from there. San Antonio is only about 75 miles away, and it is stiff with military bases. Ft. Hood is also twice as close as Corpus Christi. So calling in rescue from the coast because they needed a swimmer is just a joke. No one in San Antonio or Austin or Ft. Hood can swim?

Let's say you are drowning on Manhattan Beach, hit by a surfboard or something. How much time do the lifeguards have before you are dead? You have seen *Baywatch*: it's about three minutes, isn't it? So are they going to call in rescue teams from 200 miles away, in Las Vegas? No, Hasselhoff is going to be in the water immediately, isn't he?

So the idea this Ruskan dude flew in six hours after high tide and saved 165 people from drowning is for people on ventilators.

Also interesting is that these Ruskans of New Jersey are closely related to the Eisenhowers, including the former President.

[In this report from CNN](#), we find strange name matches. One victim of the flood, but not part of the camps, was Dr. Kathryn Eads, a “loving grandmother who helped foster care children”. Further down the page, we are told of victim Chloe Childress, a Camp Mystic counselor who drowned.



Jonathan Eades, head of The Kinkaid School, remembered Childress as someone with the ability to connect with others.

Wait. Eades. Eads. Are we seeing the same recycling of names we often see, or is this just a coincidence? And again, amazing that all these people have such professional photos, right? No one in the news has to live with rotten snapshots anymore or grainy highschool yearbook photos, since AI can produce anything you need.

Like this, for instance:



That's Bill Venus, a 33-year Army veteran who died in the flood. Amazing photo quality. But wait, is that an 18 on his shirt? Nah, couldn't be, just my imagination, running away with me. And the 33 and Venus is also just a coincidence, I'm sure.

But let's back up. I said that Grok was also using this event to promote race wars. Yep.
