No, Rodney Howard-Browne Was Not Arrested

Greetings, friends! I hope you're enjoying the latest episode of the COVID-19 Show, in which a fake pastor gets put in a fake jail for having a fake church service. Today's program is brought to you by Pfizer, BlackRock, and...De Beers Diamonds.

Rodney Howard-Browne, pastor of the River Church in Tampa, Florida, was reportedly arrested on Monday, March 30, for defying stay-at-home orders and holding a large church service. The first and most important piece of evidence to suggest this incident is all theater is that the Howard-Browne family is related to Johannes Nicolaas de Beer, after whom De Beers Diamonds is named. The moment I found out Howard-Browne was born in Cape Town, South Africa, I assumed some link to the Jewish diamond families, but figured I might have a hard time proving it. I was wrong, since it's admitted at geni.com. You have to begin with Rodney's father, <u>Frank Mervyn Derrick Howard-Brown</u>, who they don't publicly link to Rodney. The first thing we find is that Rodney's first cousin, <u>Stanley Trevor Rodney Howard-Browne</u>, married Petronella Sophia De Beer. You can follow her line straight back to the aforementioned Johannes. Remember, De Beers was financed by Rothschild & Company, quickly forming a global cartel on the diamond trade that lasted for over a century and was admittedly controlled by a small group of interrelated Jewish families. That means our "evangelical pastor" Rodney is hooked into the Jewish blood diamond money pipeline. Surprise, surprise. That answers this little crack in the narrative noted on his Wikipedia page:

Investigative journalists in his home town of Tampa reported...that since arriving from South Africa **almost penniless** in December 1989, his **sudden wealth** included a boat, a Harley Davidson motorcycle, a home in one of Tampa's exclusive gated communities

and access to a private jet; however, they were unable to find evidence of financial wrongdoing.

Yes, these rags-to-riches stories are truly perplexing, aren't they? Except that someone with the faintest inkling as to how the world really works just figured out in 10 minutes of Internet research what absolutely dumbfounded a whole crew of "investigative journalists".

The second piece of evidence of Jewish theater here is that he's a high-profile celebrity pastor whose online videos have (allegedly) millions of views. To be this highly promoted is impossible without prior connections to peerage, banking, and/or intelligence families. I've already shown some of these family ties through the De Beers, but you can probably guess his peerage connections simply through his hyphenated surname, which as usual is a dead giveaway. The Howards were most prominently Earls of Suffolk and Earls of Carlisle, and the Brownes (with an 'e', mind you) were Earls of Altamont, Marquesses of Sligo, and Viscounts Montagu. It just so happens these two families joined in 1945, when Margaret Howard married Christopher Charles Lloyd Browne. Margaret Howard was the 3rd great-granddaughter of the 5th Earl of Carlisle. But these families have actually been related <u>since at least the 1600s</u>, when Henry Browne, 5th Viscount Montagu, married the daughter of Lady Anne Howard, daughter of the 2nd Earl of Suffolk.

Per geni.com, Rodney is also quite recently a Stadler (Jewish) and a Flowerdew. There are <u>Flowerdews in the peerage</u>, related to the Mackworth baronets, and through them we link in the peerage to the names Trefusis, Deere, Maddocks, Affleck, Mann (Jewish), Blomfield (Jewish), and Proctor. The Mackworth baronets also link to the Barons Digby, as well as Bulkeleys and Gardiners.

One of Rodneys ancestors is Lt. James Hart IV, who was mayor of Queenstown in the mid-1800s. His mother was a Tamplin from Sussex, and there are Tamplins from Sussex in the <u>peerage</u> right around the same time. These Tamplins link us to the Johnstone baronets, the Lords Somerville, the Grahams, Earls of Montrose, the Lords Oliphant, the Hays, Earls of Erroll, the Knoxes, Earls of Ranfurly, and the Stuarts, Earls of Bute.

Through indirect lines Rodney is related a second time to De Beers, as well as Aldriches, Muirs, McMasters, Lennoxes, Allisons, Le Granges, Krugers (Jewish), Noonans, Rathbones, and **Bothas**. The Bothas of South Africa have spawned many well-known descendants, including South Africa's first prime minister Louis Botha and later prime minister and president P.W. Botha. Botha is a variant of Booth.

For more red flags on this guy, you can simply read <u>his Wikipedia page</u>, which is rife with them. A few excerpts will suffice:

! Howard-Browne's services are characterized by laying on of hands with worshipers giggling in apparent spiritual drunkenness, speaking in tongues, emitting animal noises, and breaking into uncontrollable holy laughter. He refers to himself as the "holy ghost bartender".

- ! Howard-Browne first came to national prominence in the US in 1999 when his Revival Ministries organization rented Madison Square Garden in New York City for six weeks, which cost him \$10 million. Again, where'd he get that money?
- ! Howard-Browne and his wife Adonica were top-ranking ("Black Diamond executive level") distributors for Monavie, a multi-level marketing company that sold acai berry juice-based beverages until folding in 2014 subsequent to a \$182 million loan default and allegations of pyramid scheming, fraudulent advertising, and patent infringement. Howard-Browne also serves as a "North America Emerald Director" for the multi-level marketing company Jeunesse.
- In July 2017, Howard-Browne was one of 17 evangelical pastors who visited the White House to pray for and lay hands on President Donald Trump. In a video several days later, Howard-Browne stated that "there is a planned attack on our president and that's all I can tell you about right now; I know what I'm talking about, I've spoken to highranking people in the government". Howard-Browne later said that the Secret Service met with him to discover which congressman told him about the plot, but he refused to say, citing pastoral privilege. If you believe any of that, you've been watching way too many Hollywood movies. But it's nice to know you can cite "pastoral privilege" as a reason not to reveal information that is critical to national security.
- ! In March 2016, Howard-Browne wrote a Facebook post titled "Donald Trump Is the New World Order's Worst Nightmare," where he detailed his choice to back Trump in the election as a check against a global conspiracy to destroy America.
- ! Howard-Browne has alleged that "They sacrifice children at the highest levels in Hollywood. They drink blood of young kids. This is a fact. The human sacrifice and the cannibalism has been going on for years" in Hollywood and Washington, D.C. In other words, he's misdirecting more truth-seekers into the Q-Anon/Pizzagate rabbit hole.
- ! Two days after the Sutherland Springs church shooting, he said that he and the church's pastors "are all heavily armed" and would use "deadly force". So instead of pointing out that the shooting, like all mass shootings, <u>was fake</u>, he instead tried to whip up fear among Christians so that they'd all come to church packing heat. What a great picture of the church following the most frequent biblical command to "fear not".
- ! In March 2018, Howard-Browne made an appearance on Alex Jones' InfoWars during which he claimed that the Austin, Texas bombings were being used by "anarchist terrorists" in an attempt to bring "everything under control", that churches and religious groups were being censored in the U.S., and that "globalist gremlins" were attempting to thwart Donald Trump. Too bad the Austin bombings were also fake.
- ! Shortly after the Christchurch mosque shootings in March 2019, Howard-Browne tweeted his opinion that it was a 'false flag' operation: "There is no doubt that what happened in New Zealand as horrific as it is, is a false flag that will be blamed on conservatives when it's all said and done!" Actually, it wasn't horrific at all, Rodney, since it didn't happen.

The third piece of evidence is the story of his arrest. Some news sites are reporting that he was arrested in his home, but <u>this *Time* article</u> admits that the county sheriff Chad Chronister "negotiated with the attorney of Pastor Rodney Howard-Browne to turn himself in to authorities." Not only that, but Chronister and his command staff met with Howard-Browne and his church leaders *beforehand*, supposedly to warn them of the dangers of meeting together. How considerate of them. What I see is that the county police and Rodney's lawyer coordinated the event ahead of time. We are told Rodney was in jail a total of 40 minutes, so there wasn't much to fake to begin with.

A closer look at Chad Chronister shows his current job is more of a constant PR campaign. Just scroll through <u>his Twitter page</u>, which is just a constant barrage of video messages about COVID-19. In one video he shares "health tips" to get through the emotional stress of COVID-19. In another he reassures residents that the local police are here for them. Yes, they are here to ensure your constitutional rights get violated through every orifice. Reading replies to his Twitter posts is fun because it shows how much this guy is hated by his local constituents.



But perhaps the most interesting thing about Chronister is his wife, Nicole DeBartolo, pictured above. A Google search on "DeBartolo Tampa" pulls up the Brooks-DeBartolo Collegiate High School of Tampa, cofounded by billionaire businessman Edward DeBartolo¹, who owns the San Francisco 49ers and whose father owned the Pittsburgh Penguins.

¹ Here's a curio for you. DeBartolo's mother is given as Marie Montani. Well, who was one of the 49ers' greatest quarterbacks? Joe Montana, of course. And on his Wikipedia page they admit his family's name was originally Montani. So he was related to the owner of the team. What, did you think Joe Montana became one of the most famous quarterbacks of all time on skill alone? Of course not. Like all famous athletes, it was nepotism that got him to the top.



Turns out this is, in fact, Chronister's father-in-law. Since his son-in-law is a sheriff, he's probably a good, law-abiding guy, right? <u>Wrong</u>:

DeBartolo was involved in the 1998 corruption case of Edwin Edwards, former governor of Louisiana. DeBartolo pleaded guilty to a charge of failing to report a felony, and received a \$1 million fine and two years of probation in return for his testimony against Edwards. DeBartolo was fined by the NFL, and barred from active control of the 49ers for a year. On February 18, 2020, President Donald Trump granted DeBartolo a presidential pardon.

He was also accused of sexual assault at his Menlo Park condo by a cocktail waitress he met at a local bar. DeBartolo settled the case out of court to the tune of \$200,000. With that kind of scumbag for a father-in-law, how much confidence do you have now in Chronister's integrity?

But back to Rodney. Once again, we find in Rodney just another ugly cousin of the trillionaires running interference for them with lots of noise and confusion. Case in point, a few weeks ago he claimed during a sermon that COVID-19 was a "phantom plague" but in the same breath said it was "engineered" by the Rockefeller Foundation. That's a strange word to use for a fake disease, isn't it? Engineered implies it is a real disease created in a lab. So which is it? Then he claimed its purpose is to shut down churches and force people to receive a vaccine that would cause mass deaths, all as part of a depopulation scheme. But if the goal is mass deaths, why not just actually engineer a super-deadly virus and unleash it on the public? Then there's the problem of the depopulation theory, since the rulers need us to, you know, *rule over*. And – oh yeah – generate all their wealth. Printing trillions in paper money and enslaving the world with perpetual interest and tax tributes only works if you have people to produce things and pay tribute. What king has ever wanted to shrink his tax base? What banker has ever wanted to shrink his debt base?

But on the matter of closing down churches, I agree. That is part of the COVID-19 scheme, and it has worked out beautifully for them. I don't know of a single church in my city that is still open. All churches are now embracing the diabolical "do your part, stay apart" mantra and have gleefully switched to "virtual church", thinking they are being good citizens. This whole plandemic has proven how deep in the pocket of our governors the Western church really is.

They know how crucial physical proximity is to any type of community, religious or otherwise. But since they particularly detest religion, Christianity is in many ways the special target of this project. Which is where Rodney Howard-Browne comes in. For those prone to fear, his fake arrest was meant to scare them into submission. But for most, the message is: only crazy, rightwing, conspiracy-theorist nutjob pastors keep their churches open. It's a blackwashing of any church that doesn't kowtow to the "greater good".

Some Christians are calling this a "soft persecution" of the church. I disagree. This isn't a persecution at all, because the church has voluntarily shuttered itself. Most churches closed well before any emergency orders were issued, based solely on recommendations coming from the CDC. Even today there are plenty of religious exemptions being granted in stay-at-home orders, including Rodney Howard-Browne's own Hillsborough County. So no, the church isn't being persecuted. It's much too cowardly to earn that badge of honor. For the church, as for all of us, this is a test. It's a test to see how much freedom you are willing to give up by mere suggestion. So call their bluff and meet anyway. See what happens. Do you really think the police will come and arrest 500 churchgoers at once, women, children, and all? There aren't enough handcuffs or cells at your local jail. Remember, there's strength in numbers, and last I checked we still outnumber them by a sizable margin. Don't give in to the normalization of "virtual church", of treating fellow Christians as walking biohazards. Don't normalize fascism, and certainly don't push it under the guise of "being a good Christian". You cannot serve two masters. You cannot be a lukewarm, "virtual" Christian. Don't let God spit you out of his mouth.

Miles: just so you know, the painted guy <u>arrested in Cincinnati</u> for partying on the streets and saying "we don't give a fuck about this coronavirus" is a similar fake. The story was manufactured to try to prevent you from doing the same thing. The governors actually have no legal standing for this shutdown or lockdown, and it is completely unenforceable. So they have to depend on self-policing and voluntary compliance. I am telling everyone I know who owns a bar, restaurant, or other storefront business to defy the fake order and re-open, but so far have found no takers. Not even in New Hampshire, where the state motto is "live free or die". I guess the whole state will now have to die, or at least go bankrupt from sheer cowardice. They will get no sympathy from me.
